

**THE INFLUENCE OF HISTORICAL PROCESSES ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE
FRENCH LANGUAGE**

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Abstract. *The article provides a brief analysis of the major historical processes that influenced the formation and development of the French language. Particular attention is paid to the Latin origins of French, linguistic changes in the territory of Gaul, Frankish rule, the centralization of the monarchy in the Middle Ages, the Ordinance of Villers-Cotterêts of 1539, the activities of the Académie française in the seventeenth century, the French Revolution, and the development of school education in the nineteenth century. One of the Academy's principal functions was to establish linguistic norms and regulate the vocabulary and grammatical usage of French. In 1694, the first edition of the *Dictionnaire de l'Académie française* was published.

By the eighteenth century, French had become an important medium of diplomacy, literature, and culture in Europe. The works of Voltaire, Diderot, Montesquieu, and other thinkers contributed significantly to the international prestige of the French language.

The French Revolution of 1789 also affected the political significance of the language.

Concepts such as "freedom," "equality," "citizenship," and "nation" became important elements of political discourse. During the revolutionary period, the wider dissemination of French throughout the country became closely associated with the question of national unity.

In the nineteenth century, the development of state education greatly contributed to the spread of French among the wider population. As primary education became free in 1881 and compulsory in 1882, standard French was disseminated more widely throughout the country through the education system. At the same time, the social status of regional languages and dialects began to decline.

Subsequently, French also spread widely beyond the borders of France. As a result of colonial expansion, education, diplomacy, and international relations, the language came to be used in Africa, North America, the Caribbean, and other regions. In the twentieth century, this process contributed to the formation of the Francophone world.

Conclusion

The present status of the French language is the result of a long historical development.
